Accomplishments & Initiatives



Accomplishments/ Initiatives for FY21-22

- Critical contracting activities underway include:
 - Managed Care Services Program contract is pending routing for final signature. Transition to Allied Managed Care scheduled for 2/1/2022.
 - Third Party Claims Administration RFP development underway in partnership with SFMTA
- Promotional Exams for succession planning in process
- Strategic Planning sessions in progress, with initial plans to heavily concentrate on reducing Total Temporary Disability duration, including using our recently-acquired ODG Guidelines and examining departmental efforts to provide temporary transitional work assignments
- Medical Provider Network committee met with two physicians in the network to discuss concerns
- Working with HSS to help support employees in mental health crisis by using EAP to bridge needed support until a WC psychologist appointment can be arranged
- Working with specified departments on projected budget shortfalls for F/Y 22
- Getting temporary staffing to help support increase in claim filings




Challenges for FY21-22

- Temporary Disability (TD) incidence and duration are forecasted to remain high throughout FY2021-2022.
- TD Rate Increases 13.5% increase adopted for CY2022 injury year, will result in an aggregate \$1.85M benefit cost increase. Permanent Total Disability, Life Pension and Death Benefits are also all impacted by the increase in SAWW and in TD.
- Medical Legal Fee schedule enacted 4/1/2021 was projected to increase these costs by 30-35%. Newest industry information reports increases of up to 50%. Estimated annualized cost increase of \$325k.
- Copy Service Fee schedule to be enacted in early 2022 will increase base document retrieval fee from \$180 to \$225 (25% increase). Estimated annualized cost increase of \$148k.
- The current labor market has made it increasingly challenging to hire and retain claims staff. 24% of WCD staff will be eligible for retirement within the next five years. Challenges in coverage due to planned and unplanned absences, combined with increased claim volume and complexity. Working to add temporary positions to address workload challenges in the short term while we examine workload staffing models.





Distribution of Employee Cases by Employer Department







Appendix 1: Claim Cause Group Definitions

Claim Cause Group	Definition	Type(s) of Injury
Abrasion	Injuries sustained as a result of rubbing against a rough surface/wall	Skin
Bodily Motion	Injuries sustained due to physical motion, such as bending, lifting, reaching, pulling/pulling, twisting/turning, etc.	Primarily orthopedic injuries.
Caught In, Under, Between	Injuries that have occurred due to being pinned by, under or between objects, furniture, or equipment. This includes injuries occurring as a result of a cave-in.	Orthopedic injuries, lacerations, crush injuries.
Cumulative Trauma	Use for repetitive stress injuries due to repeated exposure over time.	Single or multiple body parts used in repeated exposure over a period of time – e.g. Carpal Tunnel, prolonged standing, psyche stress.
Explosion	Used for injuries sustained as a result of an explosion.	Orthopedic, burns, internal, catastrophic injuries, etc.
Exposure	Used for various internal injuries, such as repeated exposure to carcinogens, stressful work situation, or hard physical work leading to a negative bodily reaction. This can also include reactions to poisonous or toxic substances.	Cancer, heart trouble, internal injuries or exposure to poison oak, MRSA, or heat stroke. Also may include foreign substance into eyes or body, or bloodborne pathogen exposure.
Fall, Slip or Trip	Injuries sustained from a slip and fall, or trips and slips. This includes falls from elevation, from stairs, ladders, onto walkways, etc.	Single or multiple body parts, resulting in sprains, strains, contusions, lacerations, fractures, etc.
Ingestion	Injury sustained due to ingesting harmful substance.	Internal/exposure.

Physical Assault	struck or striking person or people)	Single or multiple body parts involved. Results in lacerations, sprains, strains, fractures, abrasions, even internal injuries.
Stress	INITIAL CUSTAINED DIE TO WORK RELATED STRESS	Primarily psychological/psychiatric injuries, including any resulting physical symptoms.
Struck By/Against	Injuries when objects are thrown at employees, when an employee is hit by a random moving machine part or object; or collides with an object such as a door or piece of furniture.	Orthopedic or head injuries

Abrasion	ABRASION/RUBBED	Injuries sustained as a result of rubbing against a rough surface/wall
Bodily Motion	BENDING/STOOPING	Bending down to tie shoes, etc.
Bodily Motion	LIFTING	Injuries from lifting weights, desks, tables, equipment, etc.
Bodily Motion	PUSHING/PULLING	Pushing or pulling of furniture, equipment or patients.
Bodily Motion	REACHING	Reaching for equipment resulting in hyperextension of extremities, etc.
Bodily Motion	RUNNING/WALKING	Injuries while running (during exercise or running after suspects), stepping off a curb the wrong way, injuries while walking.
Bodily Motion	THROWING/WIELDING	Injury sustained during baton-use exercise or other use of equipment in a throwing or maneuvering type motion.
Bodily Motion	TWISTING/TURNING	Injuries resulting from exiting vehicle, maneuvering in small spaces, etc.
Caught In, Under, Between	CAUGHT IN, UNDER, BETWEEN	Injuries as a result of being pinned under, or between objects, furniture, or equipment.
Caught In, Under, Between	CAVE IN	Injuries sustained due to being crushed by collapsing debris, such as in a tunnel or collapsing building in a fire.
Cumulative Trauma	CONTINUOUS TRAUMA	For repetitive stress injury due to repeated exposure over time.

Exposure	ADVERSE REACTION	Dizziness/Fatigue/Headaches due to heat exposure, intense exercise, dehydration, etc. Also could be an allergic reaction or exposure to poisonous substance.
Exposure	BODILY REACTION	The body's reaction to repeated exposures to carcinogens, stressful work situations, hard physical work. This could also be an allergic reaction to a poisonous substance or toxic substance.
Exposure	CONTACT INFECTIOUS AGENT	Needle Sticks, Exposure to blood borne pathogens (blood, saliva, urine, etc.)
Exposure	CONTACT WITH CHEMICALS	Exposure to Toxin, chemicals
Exposure	CONTACT WITH ELECTRICITY	Electrocution
Exposure	CONTACT WITH EXTREME TEMPERATURE	Injuries sustained during firefighting or working in extreme heat.
Exposure	Contact with Radiation	
Exposure	DERMAL	Dermatitis due to contact with poison oak, poison ivy, etc.
Exposure	FOREIGN SUBSTANCE	Object/s getting into the eyes
Exposure	INHALATION	Injuries from smoke inhalation during firefighting, or inhaling chemical vapors.

Accomplishments & Initiatives

- Virtually met with the Intercare SFMTA team for introductions and a get to know the program.
- Worked with Intercare to re-establish Service Instruction Guidelines to meet the current needs of the SFMTA program.
- Prepared and filed complex new annual public self-insurer reports to the Office of Self Insurance Plans on 9/30/21.
- Positive COVID tests for SFMTA Employees were updated in the Claims Enterprise System and completed by 11/15/21.



Current Challenges

- State Medical Legal Fee Schedule changes expected to be adopted in 2021 that are likely to have a significant effect on the cost of medical/legal evaluations.
- <u>Vaccination Requirements</u> may have an impact on claim filing to pursue workers' compensation benefits. Currently working on procedures for unvaccinated employees who are eligible for modified duty.
- Rise in Temporary Disability Benefit Maximum is effective 1/1/22 and expected to impact the overall indemnity costs for CY 2022.
- Ongoing Review of Assault Claims
- <u>Re-Directing Injured Workers to MPN Clinics</u> instead of emergency rooms (via ambulance)
- <u>Current RTW Process</u> updates for injured employees
- Update on WC Manager position for SFMTA

COVID-19 Report



COVID-19 Report

- 152 COVID-19 Workers' Compensation Claims filed as of 9/30/21.
 - 114 Reported claims only.
 - 37 Indemnity claims reported, of which two claims are litigated.
 - 16 Accepted claims.
 - 21 Denied claims: Negative test or not occupational in nature.
 - Average paid per indemnity claim = \$4,062.
 - Average Incurred per indemnity claim = \$12,091.
 - As of 9/30/21, only 11 claims remained open.
 - Claim counts will increase due to recording Service Now employee positive reports on a report-only claim basis in order to comply with CAL/OSHA reporting standards; will affect other aggregate claim count statistics for the year. This was completed as of 11/15/21.




Claims Added Quarter Comparison










